

Remembering Shay Youngblood

Shay Youngblood died on June 11, 2024, after an extended illness. She was only 64. Loved ones surrounded her as she went to meet her ancestors. Novelist, poet, and playwright, Shay got her start at Charis Books & More (then in Atlanta, Georgia; now in Decatur, Georgia) at the Charis Circle Young Women Writers Group.From an outpouring of tributes and remembrances, we have chosen to spotlight two of them. Both Alexis Pauline Gumbs and E.R. Anderson came up through the same Charis Circle Young Women Writers Group that nurtured Shay Youngblood.
