HELPMATE, INC

In the U.S., a woman is beaten every 12 seconds. Battering is the number one cause of injury to women – more than auto accidents, muggings and rapes combined. Helpmate is the only agency in Asheville and Buncombe County that specifically addresses the issues of domestic violence by offering the following services: emergency shelter, 24-hour crisis line, counseling, support groups, referrals, court advocacy, children's programs, abuser education programs, community education and transitional housing.

NEW START FUND...

This fund was started by Womansong founder, Linda Metzner, in 1987 to provide one-time financial assistance for women who are in transition and making a new beginning. Womansong members want to encourage women in our community to make positive changes in their lives – such as leaving an abusive relationship, becoming drug-free, starting a new business, or going back to school. A referral from a social service agency is all that is needed.
