She has nurtured our project with her ideas, her writing, and encouragement. Our focus is on recording each other's stories while we are still alive and communicating.

This month, we feature Merril's life story in her own words: from lesbian awakening in Miami Beach in the 1950s, through political harassment at the University of Florida, to a decade in New York City in the '60s, then a cross-country search for land, working construction, and finally settling in rural, middle Tennessee, where she has written and stirred up "good trouble" since the 1970s. Along the way, she has championed marginalized groups through volunteer work, taught special education, and adopted five children.

Now we maintain our website and update it monthly, as you hear about through this newsletter. We are still gathering more Southern lesbian stories, interviewing, writing, editing, tracking, and networking.
