Corky Culver — heart and soul of lesbian feminist activism

Kathleen (Corky) Culver was ahead of her time and on the spot to shape the emerging lesbian feminist and peace movements of the 1960s and '70s. She was an organizer of the first all-women festival in Gainesville, the first southern lesbian conference, Lesbians Empowered for Action and Politics (LEAP), and a founder of the North Forty women's land (founded in 1972 and still thriving). She participated in the early discussions and helped start what was probably the country's first lesbian consciousness raising group. Her home was a destination and welcoming shelter for travelling and local lesbians for decades. She's been to jail for justice and helped organize the 400-mile Peace Walk through Florida in 1983.

Her path toward and through higher education was uniquely her own. Eventually she obtained a doctorate in English and even more eventually she began teaching at the college level. She has published two books of poetry and has more in process.
